

- 1 Define the term contraception
- The deliberate use of artificial methods or other techniques to prevent pregnancy

- 2 Which type of contraception protects against sexually transmitted infections? Give an example
- Barrier methods e.g. male or female condoms

- What is the name given to chemicals that disable sperm cells? How effective is using this technique alone?
- Spermicide not very effective (only 70% or 7/10)

- 4 Which two hormones can be found in hormonal contraceptives and how does each work?
- Oestrogen and progesterone
- Oestrogen (both) inhibit FSH production so eggs don't develop
- Progesterone stimulates the production of thick mucus in the cervix so sperm can't pass through

- 5 Discuss the pro's and con's of using the contraceptive pill versus the contraceptive implant
- Both are very effective and rely on hormones
- The pill has to be taken every day which is inconvenient and easy to miss
 - But it is fairly easy to take a pill, little chance of harm or pain
- The contraceptive implant only has to be implants every 3 years, so no need to remember it each day
 - But the implantation and removal is unpleasant and can be painful
- Because the pill can be easily missed, it is often not taken properly which can allow pregnancy

- 6 What is the difference between the plastic and copper intrauterine devices (IUDs)?
- The plastic IUD releases progesterone which stimulates mucus in the cervix so sperm can't pass
- The copper IUD kills/disables the sperm that enter the cervix

- A couple with two children have decided they don't want to have any more children

 Suggest a suitable long term contraception for the man and the women and explain how they work
- The man could have a vasectomy which involves his vas deferens (spermatic cord) being cut and tied, so that he can no longer ejaculate sperm
- The women could have 'sterilisation' which involves her fallopian tubes being cut and tied so that eggs can no longer pass from the ovaries to the uterus

- 8 Some religious couples do not accept artificial methods of contraception. Suggest two alternative methods, and discuss how effective each are.
- Abstinence 100% effective
- Withdrawing from sexual intercourse before ejaculation not very effective at all
- Only have sex at certain times of the month also generally very ineffective
